The highlight was a fantastic practical demonstration involving Mrs Mitchell and Mrs Fitton, who bravely volunteered to be blindfolded for an exciting challenge; they were directed around the playground to find treasure!






CLASS 2 NEWS


CLASS 3 NEWS

Attendance



This week, our attendance has dipped to 96.6%, which is a slight decrease from our previous weeks' 97.5%.

Research consistently demonstrates that attendance plays a crucial role in academic success. Pupils maintaining 95-100% attendance are significantly more likely to meet expected standards across key subjects. As parents, you have a legal responsibility to ensure your child attends school regularly. Absences should be limited to genuine illness or pre-approved exceptional circumstances.

We are also implementing stricter procedures around punctuality. Our school gate closes at 8.55am, marking the start of lessons. Timely arrival is essential to ensure pupils do not miss critical learning time.
